A snapshot of the current landscape of Al policy across the states

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As artificial intelligence drives profound changes across the country, state legislatures are moving swiftly to address new challenges and opportunities. While federal legislation continues to lag behind innovation, state policymakers are stepping in to address regulatory gaps.

This tracker is designed to capture and categorize the wide range of AI legislation considered at the state level in 2024. It provides a comprehensive overview of the current trends shaping AI governance at the state level by highlighting key areas of focus, emerging themes, and different regulatory approaches.

#### Main Takeaways

An Emergent Focus on Discrimination in Automated Decision Systems

In 2024, one issue legislators focused on was bias and fairness in automated decision systems, with **20 bills** introduced across **12 different states**.

An automated decision system is a computer program, algorithm, or piece of software designed to assist or make a decision. Companies use automated decision systems in various high-stakes contexts, from lending, to housing, to hiring, to insurance pricing, to law enforcement. For example, a resume-screening program that filters job applicants on certain criteria and makes hiring recommendations is an automated decision system, as is software that evaluates a potential tenant's suitability by assessing factors like credit, prior evictions, and income. These tools range from complex artificial intelligence systems that learn and adapt over time by analyzing vast amounts of data, to simple algorithms that operate on fixed models such as scoring systems or decision trees.

When companies use automated decision systems in high-stakes decisions, they can have a significant impact on individuals' lives, making them a clear focus for policymakers. The motivation behind these legislative efforts stems from a couple of concerns. One is algorithmic discrimination – that is, the risk that these systems can reinforce social biases and discriminate against people based on their race, gender, or other aspects of their identity. A prominent example of algorithmic discrimination is the COMPAS risk assessment tool used by judges and parole boards to make decisions about bail and sentencing. A data-driven investigation from ProPublica revealed that COMPAS was twice as likely to incorrectly classify black defendants as high-risk when compared to white defendants.

A second concern motivating legislators relates to transparency in consequential decisions: ensuring that consumers understand the criteria and outcomes when automated decision systems help make high-stakes decisions about their lives. This is already the norm to some extent in credit reporting, where companies are required to provide explanations to consumers, and consumers have the right to correct any incorrect personal information.

Many of the 20 bills focused on automated decision systems covered a wide variety of high-stakes use cases, such as access to lending, housing, hiring, insurance, education enrollment, and more. However, one sector drew particular focus from legislators: three bills focused exclusively on tools used in hiring and employment. Among the 20 bills introduced in 2024 with a focus on automated decision making, two pieces of legislation were signed into law. SB 205 from Colorado, which will take effect in February of 2026, imposes requirements for developers and deployers of Al-driven decision-making tools, such as impact assessments and required disclosures to consumers. HB 3773 from Illinois is focused on protections against algorithmic discrimination in employment.



Combating Deepfakes and the Emergence of Provenance Legislation

Addressing the risks and challenges posed by deepfakes was another major focus of the 2024 legislative session.

Deepfakes are highly realistic, but entirely fake, audio, video, and visual content produced by someone using advanced Al. Deepfakes can spread political misinformation. For example, a February 2024 robocall in New Hampshire used Al-generated audio to impersonate President Joe Biden and deceptively urged voters to skip the Democratic primary. Deepfakes can also be used to mislead or defraud consumers. For example, in 2024, Al-generated deepfake videos falsely depicted celebrities such as Piers Morgan and Oprah Winfrey endorsing a controversial self-help guide created by an influencer. Non-consensual intimate images generated with the help of Al editing tools have also proliferated online, with users targeting everyone from A-list celebrities, to public servants, to teenagers.

Legislators introduced 111 bills focused on deepfakes across 43 states, more than any category of Al bill that we tracked. Of those 111 bills, 34 were signed into law. Most of the bills addressed one of two issues: the creation or distribution of artificially generated non-consensual intimate images, and deepfakes' impact on election integrity and political campaigning.

Alongside these efforts, we observed a growing interest among legislators in provenance and watermarking legislation. Provenance refers to the general practice of tracking the creation of a digital asset, while watermarking is the process of embedding a marker in digital material to identify its source. In the context of Al-generated content, watermarking or other provenance strategies can be used to track content as authentic, or artificially generated, thereby enabling companies and platforms to potentially label or remove deepfakes while increasing trust in genuine content.

In 2024, there were **10 bills introduced across 7 states focused on provenance and watermarking**. Few of those bills passed. One bill that includes provenance requirements that did pass is <u>SB 131</u> in Utah. SB 131 focuses on audio and visual communications intended to influence voting that contain synthetic media, and includes a subsection requiring "embedded tamper-evident digital content provenance" in these forms of media.

#### Who Gets a Seat at the Table?

Many states proposed or passed legislation in 2024 creating task forces or committees to study artificial intelligence, or to make recommendations on the next steps for policymakers. Although these bills might not always lead to immediate change, they offer insights into who gets to influence Al policy discussions.

Of the **35 bills proposing task forces or studies** introduced in this legislative session, **8 were signed into law in 2024**. Many task forces include representatives from different sectors, including industry, government, public interest groups, and academic experts. Across the 8 task force bills that were signed into law, 129 task force positions were created. Of those 129 positions, legislators dedicated **13 positions to representatives from public interest groups**, such as groups that defend civil liberties, or that represent a certain population, like disabled residents, or organized labor. Legislators created **22 positions for industry representatives**, such as representatives of a specific sector and representatives of business associations. Only **two positions were designated for representatives of consumers**, highlighting a potential imbalance in representation.

We did not count task force positions created for an 'expert' towards either the total number of public interest group positions or industry positions in the analysis above if it was not clear the expert role was intended to be filled by someone from industry, or someone from a public interest group. Positions designated for members of academia and representatives of government were also not counted towards the total number of public interest group positions or industry positions.

These bills underscore the importance of ensuring different interests are able to have a voice in shaping legislation. However, the imbalance of public interest and industry representation, with even fewer consumer advocacy voices, raises concerns that industry perspectives may disproportionately influence AI policy conversations.



#### **Tracker Scope**

As of September 5, 2024, this tracker provides an overview of state-level AI legislation in 2024. Most states have concluded their legislative sessions for the year; however, some states remain in session or have special sessions, and some bills remain on Governors' desks. The status and content of some bills may still change as legislative sessions in those states continue.

Bills were included in this tracker if they substantively focused on artificial intelligence. Bills that focus primarily on privacy issues were excluded, as were bills mentioning—but not focusing—on artificial intelligence technology. A wide variety of issues intersect with AI, and this tracker does not capture every single bill that might affect the AI landscape.

Many states utilize the companion bill system, where the same bill is introduced in both chambers. To avoid redundancy, we list only the Senate version of companion bills.

Many bills have multiple sponsors. To streamline the tracker, we only listed the first sponsor mentioned on each bill. Other sponsors can easily be found by following the bill link and navigating the bill page.

#### **Bill Categories**

Generative AI: Receives a check-mark if a piece of legislation applies mostly/completely to generative AI

**Public Transparency**: Contains requirements for developers and deployers to disclose relevant information about their artificial intelligence system to the public. Often includes requirements regarding disclosure of safety tests, training data, or algorithmic explanations.

**Safety/Risk Mitigation**: Contains requirements for developers and deployers to take appropriate measures to mitigate general safety risks associated with their artificial intelligence systems.

**Data Protection and Privacy**: Contains requirements for the protection of personal data in artificial intelligence systems. Often relates to data collection, storage, or sharing practices.

**Provenance/Watermarking**: Contains requirements for the tracking and authentication of content generated by artificial intelligence.

**Bias and Fairness**: Contains requirements for preventing and mitigating bias in artificial intelligence algorithms.

**Deepfakes**: Contains requirements for the creation, distribution, and disclosure of content generated by artificial intelligence that is fake but appears authentic. Often focused around areas where it could purposefully mislead or harm individuals.

**Task Force/Study**: Creates a task force based around some aspect of artificial intelligence, or commissions a report on some aspect of artificial intelligence.
